We look forward to working with the City and various levels of government in the redevelopment of this exciting project.

SUBJECT: Private Retail Sale of Cannabis

1) PURPOSE

The purpose of the report is to provide Council with information gathered after consulting the public on allowing or not allowing private retail storefronts for the sale of cannabis.

2) HISTORY, BACKGROUND, COUNCIL POLICY, PRACTICES

On December 10, 2018, Council considered Planning and Development Report 2018-152 regarding cannabis legislation and the City's position on private sale of cannabis in retail stores.

Council referred the decision, passing the following:

That the Director of Planning and Development be directed to conduct public engagement including a telephone survey, online survey, and open house, and to report back to Council on the retail sale of cannabis, for consideration at the January 14 meeting of Committee of the Whole/Council.

3) STAFF COMMENTS AND DISCUSSIONS

On December 13, 2018, the City created and posted an online survey. Attached as Appendix A is a copy of the survey and its results.

On December 13, 2018, the City engaged the services of Oraclepoll Research Limited to conduct a telephone survey. Attached as Appendix B is a report of their survey results.

On January 2, 2019, the City held an Open House from 5-7 p.m. that was attended by 45 residents. Attached as Appendix C are the results and comments received.

On December 14, 2018, the Province published regulation 497/18, which introduced new legislation dealing with licensing for private retail cannabis sale (attached as Appendix D). The legislation amended regulation 468/18 being the initial licensing regulation.

The following was introduced and summarized:

 Only 25 licenses for cannabis retail stores will be issued initially, meaning no more than 25 cannabis retail stores will open on April 1, 2019 in Ontario. There is no information or timeframe for granting additional licenses.

- Port Colborne/Niagara is in a region of the province allocated seven licenses at this point. This region includes Hamilton, Guelph, Kitchener, Waterloo, London, Windsor and Sarnia.
- Until the number of retail licenses available increases to more than 25, no cannabis retail store can be located in a municipality with a population of less than 50,000 people.
- Should the City of Port Colborne opt-in for cannabis retail stores there is no timeframe or guarantee as to when or if a location will open.

Public Consultation Results

Online Survey:

1,411 surveys completed

71% in favour of opting in 22% in favour of opting out

7% in favour of opting out for now

Telephone Survey: 400 interviews completed 56% in favour of opting in

25% in favour of opting out

19% in favour of opting out for now

Open House:

45 members of the public attended

38% in favour of opting in - 9 responses 54% in favour of opting out- 13 responses

8% in favour of opting out for now-2 responses

Upon review of the survey results, opting in to allow cannabis retail stores scored the greater percentage than opting out or opting out for now (and opting in at a later date).



Q1 Are you a resident of Port Colborne?



Q2 What option should the City of Port Colborne choose in allowing cannabis retail stores?






Q4 If you were to use cannabis where would you prefer to obtain it?




Q6 Indicate your view on the following statement. Retail stores for recreational cannabis will create jobs and benefit the economy, through additional taxes, in Port Colborne.

While people have a difficult time accepting that cannabis is now legal, the bottom line is that it is now legal, and is regulated, inspected and subject to ongoing scrutiny. I understand people will point to the licensed producer on Pinecrest Road and say that attracted a criminal element. And that's true, it did. But it did because it was operating illegally. Growing far more than allowed and illegally distributing it. There is at least one other licensed producer in Port Colborne and as far as I know it has never had an issue with people trying to rob it. As for those who say the stores should be located in the industrial park, then we should also move the LCBO and Beer Store to the same location. We know what alcohol, also a legal product, does to people. Taken from the Port Colborne Leader: Ward 4 Coun. Harry Wells cast doubt on the entire idea of legalized weed sales. "There's a lot of misnomers about the benefits of this industry," said Wells. "We need to know if this industry is even going to be a benefit to our society." We clearly know the sale of alcohol does not benefit society in any way at all and yet we still allow its sale. Stop the sale of alcohol and you'll stop drunk driving, all kinds of health issues and also many domestic violence issues. But we won't stop the sale of alcohol because it generates jobs and tax dollars in Niagara - the wine industry, places like Breakwall Brewery, and Dillion's Distillery are just a few examples of the industry in Niagara. Outside of the recreational use of cannabis, it has many health proven health benefits too lengthy to go into detail here. It's easily researched. Many doctors are turning to it and its byproducts to wean people off of drugs like oxycodone and others that are highly addictive and cause many societal problems. This city is well known for its issues with prescription drugs. Also from the Port Colborne Leader: Sylvia Fanon, spoke during the debate, and she was vehemently opposed to marijuana, legal or otherwise, "Cannabis smells absolutely awful," she said. "This decision could have a very negative affect. I don't want Port Colborne to become a tourist destination for pot." Yes, where cannabis grows does smell if the right measures are not put in place. You know what else smells in this town, Jungbunzlauer's plant it bought from Casco/Ingredion. Depending on the wind direction, you can smell a burning odour across the city. An odour that is never dealt with. Let's not even get into the chicken barns out near Miller and Second Concession, or quarry operations off of Highway 140. Things smell. And as far as cannabis smoke coming off of people, well, cigarette smoke is just as bad or worse. And speaking of cigarettes, we definitely know what tobacco does to people and yet it's still legal. Call for a ban on tobacco, a complete ban, if you want to help society. This city will not be a destination for cannabis if a retail store opens here. Their first concern is the risk and susceptibility to theft. This point is senseless since every storefront (ie. jewelry, antiques, and other valuables) has an inherent risk and susceptibility to theft and/or breakins. As I understand, there will be further controls and regulations required by the provincial (if not federal) government that will mitigate this risk (ie. alarms, video surveillance/monitoring, etc). Their second concern is increased access to children. Though I agree that access to cannabis needs to be restricted to medicinal use and to those above the legal age limit (studies show negative impact on developing minds; those under 21 years of age), I would argue that licensed retail storefronts will not increase minors' access to cannabis and are, in fact, necessary to decrease minors' access to cannabis. Currently, cannabis is only available to Port Colborne residents through the OCS or illegally through the black market (which does not discriminate based on age). The outcry among Ontario residents over unreasonably late deliveries and limited selection has been substantial. These same residents will eventually (if they have not already) turn to the black market if these deficiencies are not addressed. If the black market continues to thrive, then access to cannabis for minors will continue to be an issue. From here it is easy to draw the cause and effect. If cannabis is readily available to legal residents in licensed retail stores, the black market will struggle and dwindle. 

Cannabis Retail Store Survey Report



December 2018

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Methodology & Logistics

Background & Overview:

The following represents the findings from a December 2018 public opinion telephone survey of City of Port Colborne residents (19 years of age or older) conducted by Oraclepoll Research Limited for The City of Port Colborne. The purpose of the research was to gather opinions from residents on issues related to allowing cannabis retail stores in the community.

Study Sample:

A total of N=400 interviews were completed. The survey screened in Q1 to ensure respondents were 19 years of age or older. The age samples were also monitored to ensure they reflected the demographic characteristics of the community.

Survey Method:

All surveys were conducted by telephone using live operators at the Oraclepoll call center facility. A total of 20% of all interviews were monitored and the management of Oraclepoll Research Limited supervised 100%.

The survey was conducted using computer-assisted techniques of telephone interviewing (CATI) and random number selection (RDD). A dual sample frame random database was used that was inclusive of landline and cellular telephone numbers.

Logistics:

Surveys were conducted by telephone at the Oraclepoll call center using person to person live operators from the days of December 13th and December 17th, 2018.

Initial calls were made between the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. Subsequent callbacks of no-answers and busy numbers were made on a (staggered) daily rotating basis up to 5 times (from 10:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.) until contact was made. In addition, telephone interview appointments were attempted with those respondents unable to complete the survey at the time of contact. If no contact was made at a number after the fifth attempt, the number was discarded and a new one supplanted it.

Confidence:

The margin of error for the total N=400 sample is $\pm 4.9\%$ at 95% confidence.

Preamble

After being screened to ensure they were residents of the City of Port Colborne 19 years of age or older (Q1), all N=400 respondents were read the following introductory statement. The preamble set the context for the questions to be asked by providing background information about the legalization of cannabis and the provincial guidelines for retail stores in Ontario. This also included what options municipalities have along with what funding they will receive.

Before we begin, I am going to read a short introduction about retail cannabis sales.

Recreational cannabis was legalized Oct. 17, 2018 by the federal government. The province has laws in place about how, where and who can buy and possess cannabis in Ontario and Ontario's Ministry of the Attorney General is currently drafting regulations for the private retail sales of cannabis. These regulations are anticipated to be in place for April 1, 2019. While the Ontario Cannabis Store opened online on Oct. 17, 2018, the province is moving forward with a regulated private retail model for cannabis stores. The Provincial Alcohol and Gaming Commission (AGCO) is charged with licencing, regulating and enforcement of private cannabis retail stores. The AGCO will begin accepting applications for new stores this December, with the intent to have private retail cannabis stores operational by April 1, 2019. On that date, retail cannabis stores will be permitted to operate in a community only if a municipality decides to "opt-in" or allow them.


Cannabis stores may only operate 150 metres from a school and in an area already zoned for commercial use. Opting out or not allowing stores does not prohibit legal consumption of cannabis, it only prohibits retail sales in the municipality.


Municipalities are being offered the opportunity to opt-out or not allow retail stores, but they must so by January 22, 2019. If the City decides to opt-out it can still opt-in at any time, but if it opts-in it cannot opt-out in the future. On January 14, 2019, City Council will consider opting-in or opting-out.

After the script was read, respondents were asked questions about cannabis retail stores in Port Colborne.

Support / Opposition to Cannabis Stores

The first question was asked to all N=400 respondents about allowing retail cannabis stores in Port Colborne. They were presented with three options from which to choose their desired outcome. The options included opting in to allow stores in April 2019, opting out or not permit them and opting out now to consider allowing retail cannabis stores in the future.





In total, 56% of residents are in favor of opting-in to allow cannabis retail stores in the community next April 2019. Younger respondents most back this move including 93% of 19-29-year old's and 90% of those 30-44, while support drops to 45% among those aged 45-59 and 43% in the 60 or over cohort.

There are almost two in ten (19%) that feel the City should opt-out for now and consider the option in the future. This sentiment was most felt among residents 60+ at 27% and 45-59 at 21% – this compared to 5% of 18-29 and 2% of 30-44-year old's.


One-quarter (25%) want the City to opt-out of allowing cannabis retailers. Older residents 45-59 (34%) and 60+ (30%) were most inclined to feel this way compared to younger citizens 19-29 (3%) and 30-44 (9%).


Provincial Funding

All N=400 respondents were next read the following statement that outlined the funding formula of the Government of Ontario to date as well as for opting-out and opting-in. They were then asked if the funding would make them more likely to support having cannabis retailers in the community.

The City of Port Colborne has received an initial payment of \$13,107 from a \$15 million Provincial Fund to help with costs that directly relate to the legalization of recreational cannabis. A second payment will be provided as follows:

- a. If the City opts out a maximum of \$5000 will be provided.
- b. If the City opts in a minimum of \$5000 will be provided from a \$15 million Provincial Fund shared between those municipalities that allow retail stores. Further funding may be provided to those municipalities that opt in to retail cannabis stores.






There was a split of opinion with 47% saying the Provincial funding will make them more likely to support retail cannabis outlets in the City and 43% claiming it will not or have no impact, while 10% did not know or were unsure. Those most likely to answer yes were 19-24 (95%) and 30-44 (90%), while responses of no were strongest among the cohorts of 45-59 (61%) and 60 or over (54%). The oldest 60+ had the highest incidence of replying do not know (17%).

Seventy-eight percent of residents that support opting-in answered yes, in relation to only 1% that want to opt-out and 13% that back opting-out now to consider the option in the future.

Preferred Purchase Method

Next, respondents were asked about their preferred method to purchase cannabis – either online or at a retail store. This question is projective or hypothetical and was not intended to be a definitive indication of one's usage or intended usage. Results below reveal how citizens prefer the sale of legal cannabis to be distributed.



Sixty-one percent responded to the question by saying they have no intent of using cannabis (91% – 60 or older, 64% – 40 to 59, 10% – 30 to 54 & 2% – 18 to 29). Among those with an opinion, storefront retail was most named by 35% of residents, while only 3% preferred an online only option and 1% a homegrown option.

Retail storefronts had the highest response from those in the 19-29 (78%) and 30-44 (81%) cohorts, next followed by 40-59-year old's (35%), but only 8% of respondents 60+. Sixty-percent that support opting-in now also named storefronts. Online purchasing was most recalled by 19-29 (13%) and 30-44 (8%) year old's, while the grow your own option was primarily named by the youngest 19-29 (7%).

Concerns

In an open-ended or unaided question allowing for multiple responses, residents were asked to state any concerns they had with respect to allowing retail cannabis stores in the City.




While 22% (95% of 19-29 & 65% of 30-44-year old's) said they had no concerns over allowing retail cannabis stores in the community, those with mentions most cited having them in proximity to sensitive land uses such as schools and daycares (21%). The next most recalled concern was over safety and security by 16%, followed by the related issue of crime (14%). Odor was named by 13%, their hours of operation by 7%, while lesser citations related to minors accessing cannabis (3%), health concerns (2%) and impaired driving (2%).

Economic Benefits

Respondents were asked to rate their level of agreement with a statement related to the economic benefits of cannabis retailers in the community.

"Please rate your level of agreement with the following statement using a scale from one strongly disagree to five strongly agree."






Slightly more than half or 53% of residents agree (14%) or strongly agree (39%) that retail cannabis stores will have economic benefits for the local economy. Thirty-six percent disagreed (6%) or strongly disagreed (30%), while there are 11% that hold a neutral view on the topic – neither agreeing nor disagreeing.

Agreement was strongest among residents 18-29 (97%) and 30-44 (85%), while disagreement was highest with those aged 45-59 (47%) and 60+ (46%). Those that favor opting-in now most agreed (87%), those opting-out tended to disagree (86%), while respondents wanting to consider opting-in the future were more split (60% – disagree, 20% – agree & 20% – neither agree nor disagree).

Legalization – Support

Respondents were asked to rate their level of agreement with a statement related to the economic benefits of cannabis retailers in the community.

"Do you support or oppose the legalization of cannabis in Canada?"



More than six in ten majority or 61% of Port Colborne residents support the legalization of cannabis, while 39% are in opposition. Support in the community is largely determined as a function of age (19 to 29 - 95%, 30 to 44 - 90%, 45 to 59 - 49% & 60 or over -50%).

Most respondents or 62% had no further comments to add, while the top two mentioned from those with an opinion just reinforced either their support or opposition. The remaining responses tended to reflect the need to ensure regulations are enforced or restrictions are put in place.

Summary

More than six in ten Port Colborne residents support the legalization of cannabis with younger respondents under the age of 45 most in favor of the policy. Slightly fewer but a still 56% majority support having the City opting-in to allow cannabis retail stores in the community in April 2019. A further 19% feel that the City should opt-out for now and consider the option in the future, while opposition to opting in stands at one-quarter. Residents 18-29 and 30-44 most back a policy of allowing retail cannabis operators in the community, while support is tepid among older cohorts.

Provincial funding appears to only have an impact on those already in support of opting in. As such, there was a split of opinion with 47% saying the Provincial funding will make them more likely to support retail cannabis outlets in the City and 43% claiming it will not or have no impact, while 10% did not know or were unsure.

Storefront retail stores are the preferred method of purchasing cannabis by more than a third, while few named online or growing their own. Slightly more than six in ten have no interest in purchasing cannabis.

Concerns most mentioned as it relates to cannabis retail stores tends to focus on their proximity to sensitive areas including schools and daycares. The next most recalled concern was over safety and security as well as crime and then odor.


There is not a strong belief in the economic benefits that will accrue as a result of allowing retailers in the community. Only slightly more than half or 53% of residents agreed that retail cannabis stores will have economic benefits for the local economy, 36% disagreed and 11% were neutral neither agreeing nor disagreeing.

Port Colborne Cannabis Retail Store Open House- January 2, 2019

The City hosted an Open House at City Hall on January 2, 2019 from 5-7pm. There were 45 members of the public in attendance. On display was information about cannabis retail store legislation as well as detail explanation of what is involved in the opt-in opt out options. Residents were asked two questions which were pulled from the online and telephone surveys. The responses are captured below. Residents who had not completed the surveys were also given the opportunity to complete a hard copy and staff

Amending O. Reg. 468/18 (GENERAL)

1. Ontario Regulation 468/18 is amended by adding the following sections:

MAXIMUMS, ALLOCATIONS AND APPLICATION RESTRICTIONS

Authorization maximums and allocations

- 8.1 (1) In this section,
- "census division" means a census division as identified in the 2016 Census of Canada, as reported by Statistics Canada under the Statistics Act (Canada); ("division de recensement")
- "East Region" means the following census divisions: Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry; Prescott and Russell; Ottawa; Leeds and Grenville; Lanark; Frontenac; Lennox and Addington; Hastings; Prince Edward; Northumberland; Peterborough; Kawartha Lakes; Simcoe; Muskoka; Haliburton; Renfrew; ("région de l'Est")
- "GTA Region" means the following census divisions, but does not include the Toronto census division: Durham; York; Peel; Halton; ("région du Grand Toronto")
- "North Region" means the following census divisions: Nipissing; Parry Sound; Sudbury; Greater Sudbury; Timiskaming; Cochrane; Algoma; Thunder Bay; Rainy River; Kenora; ("région du Nord")
- "Toronto Region" means the Toronto census division; ("région de Toronto")
- "West Region" means the following census divisions: Dufferin; Wellington; Hamilton; Niagara; Haldimand-Norfolk; Brant; Waterloo; Perth; Oxford; Elgin; Chatham-Kent; Essex; Lambton; Middlesex; Huron; Bruce; Grey; Manitoulin. ("région de l'Ouest")
 - (2) No more than 25 retail store authorizations may be issued and in effect at any given time.
 - (3) The issuance of retail store authorizations is subject to the following allocation rules:
 - A maximum of five retail store authorizations is allocated in respect of cannabis retail stores to be located in the Toronto Region.
 - 2. A maximum of six retail store authorizations is allocated in respect of cannabis retail stores to be located in the GTA Region.
 - A maximum of five retail store authorizations is allocated in respect of cannabis retail stores to be located in the East Region.
 - A maximum of two retail store authorizations is allocated in respect of cannabis retail stores to be located in the North Region.
 - A maximum of seven retail store authorizations is allocated in respect of cannabis retail stores to be located in the West Region.
- (4) Until such time as more than 25 retail store authorizations may be issued, none of the retail store authorizations that may be issued in accordance with subsection (3) may be allocated,
 - (a) to the holder of a retail store authorization or a person whose affiliate holds a retail store authorization;
 - (b) to a licensed producer or affiliate of a licensed producer; or
 - (c) in respect of a cannabis retail store that would be located in a municipality with a population of less than 50,000.
 - (5) The Commission shall, on request, provide a person with information about the boundaries of the Regions.

Precondition of application, expression of interest

- 8.2 (1) A person may not apply for a retail operator licence unless,
- (a) the person submits to the Registrar, in the form and manner specified by the Registrar, a written expression of interest which, for the purposes of section 8.1, identifies the Region referred to in that section in which the person wishes to locate a cannabis retail store; and
- (b) is notified by the Registrar that the person may apply for a retail operator licence.
- (2) For the purposes of clause (1) (b), the Registrar shall choose a method for selecting which of the persons who have submitted an expression of interest may make an application that does not rely on the exercise of discretion on the part of the Registrar or any other person.
- (3) A person may submit an expression of interest with respect to more than one Region, but may only be selected in relation to one of those expressions of interest.
- (4) A person who submits to the Registrar more than one expression of interest with respect to the same Region may not apply for a retail operator licence.
- (5) Two or more persons who are affiliates of one another may, subject to subsection (6), each submit expressions of interest, but of those affiliates only one may be selected in relation to one of those expressions of interest.
- (6) If two or more persons who are affiliates of one another each submit to the Registrar an expression of interest with respect to the same Region, those affiliates may not apply for a retail operator licence.
 - (7) Subsections (3) to (6) apply despite the results of the method chosen under subsection (2).
- (8) An applicant for a retail store authorization is not eligible to be issued an authorization in respect of a cannabis retail store that is located in a Region other than the Region identified in the expression of interest in relation to which the applicant was permitted to apply for a retail operator licence.

Revocation

- 8.3 Sections 8.1, 8.2 and this section are revoked on December 13, 2019.
- 2. (1) Section 12 of the Regulation is revoked.
- (2) The Regulation is amended by adding the following section:

Maximum permissible authorizations

- 12. The Registrar shall refuse to issue a retail store authorization if,
- (a) the applicant already holds 75 retail store authorizations; or
- (b) the applicant and its affiliates between them already hold 75 retail store authorizations.

Commencement

- 3. (1) Subject to subsection (2), this Regulation comes into force on the day it is filed.
- (2) Subsection 2 (2) comes into force on the first anniversary of the day this Regulation is filed.

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Cannabis Retail Sale Policy Statement

Purpose & Vision

The purpose of this policy statement is to provide a format for input to the Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario (AGCO) as well as help prospective recreational cannabis retailers in their consideration of location of cannabis retail stores in the City of Port Colborne.

The AGCO is the provincial authority that licences cannabis retail operators, authorizes cannabis retail locations and licenses senior store staff. The City has no licensing authority.

The AGCO regulates and reviews all aspects of the retail operation including municipal and public input, that the proposed store location is consistent with the public interest as defined in the cannabis regulations.

The City of Port Colborne has chosen to allow retail sales of recreational cannabis. The following provides City staff with guidance on commenting to AGCO when notice on a specific proposed cannabis retail store site is provided on the site location.

Principles for Cannabis Retail Store Locations

Relationship to Other Applicable Law:

Land Use Planning: The provincial licensing process does not remove the requirement to comply with the zoning by-law and other municipal planning documents. The definitions within the City's Official Plan and Zoning By-law are applicable to all retail, including cannabis retail stores. Retail sale of cannabis from a provincially licensed store is legal and is a permitted use in the zones that permit retail use.

City Building Inspections: while the licencing of the store operation is the responsibility of the AGCO, the Building Code applies to cannabis retail store locations. Therefore, where a building permit is required, the building inspector will undertake duties as usual. Fire Code compliance is also mandatory.

For the purposes of this policy statement, a cannabis retail store shall mean a store licenced by the AGCO.

Cannabis Retail Stores and Sensitive Activities

In order to help ensure public health and safety, protect youth and reduce illegal sales, retail cannabis stores are discouraged where nearby properties are designed to serve youth including public and most private schools. A distance buffer of 150m is required from a cannabis retail store to these uses and will include libraries, parks, and community, mental health or addiction centres.

Cannabis retail stores should not be permitted in locations that have no regard to protecting youth.

This policy is written in regards to public health, protection of youth and the regulatory definition of the public interest.

The Zoning By-law 6575/30/18 will provide which zone permits retail use and its Schedules will illustrate where zones are located throughout the City.

While it is recommended that every position be filled Council can choose to leave a position unfilled during the term of Council. Council should appoint at least one member to each committee.

Mayor Steele has been appointed for a three-month term to the Niagara Peninsula Conservation Authority (NPCA) by Niagara Regional Council. Staff will bring forward a recommendation for the appointment at a future meeting at the direction of the Niagara Region.

The composition of the Canal Days Committee has been changed to comprise of staff and members of Council. As a result, staff are recommending an increase of members of Council to three members and the Mayor. This allows for the committee to continue to act in an advisory capacity with all significant decisions being brought to meetings of Council. This composition will ensure that citizen engagement continues at the Council level as necessary.

In addition to the board and committee appointments that were deferred on December 10, 2018, staff are looking for the appointment of two members of Council to act in a back-up capacity in the case of an emergency within the City where the Mayor is absent. Previously this position was filled by the acting Deputy Mayor. This change is recommended as training is required for the position and due to the need for a clear point of contact during an emergency. As the Deputy Mayor role alternates throughout the term of Council it may be difficult for emergency staff to reach the correct person in a reasonable amount of time.

4) OPTIONS AND FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

a) Do Nothing

This is not a recommended option as boards and committees require Council representation to maintain viability.

Council may choose to give the Clerk specific additional direction with regard to future appointment activities.

SUBJECT: Collaboration with Town of Fort Erie for Memory Clinic Services

1) PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to request approval for the City to commit fifty percent funding to a two-year collaborative partnership with the Town of Fort Erie to secure Registered Nurse support for the Mapleview Medical Memory Clinic, at a total cost of \$3,840 (representing fifty percent of the total cost).

2) HISTORY, BACKGROUND, COUNCIL POLICY, PRACTICES

For some time, Registered Nurse support has been unavailable at the Port Colborne Memory Clinic located at Mapleview Medical Clinic. The Town of Fort Erie, which until recently was in the same position, has advised that a Registered Nurse has been identified to provide support services for their Memory Clinic operating out of Douglas Memorial Hospital. Further, the Town of Fort Erie (the "Town") contacted the City to propose a partnership to share Registered Nurse and administrative support services between the Memory Clinics located in the respective municipalities.

At its meeting of November 26, 2018, the City's Medical Education, Recruitment and Health Services Committee received and considered the Town of Fort Erie's proposal, and recommended Council support same.

3) STAFF COMMENTS AND DISCUSSIONS

The Port Colborne Memory Clinic utilizes a team approach to accurately diagnose dementia with a number of tests for memory, spatial awareness, reasoning and response to stimuli. The clinic improves access to specialist care and provides a service to patients and caregivers when memory disorder is suspected. Further, the Memory Clinic achieves the following:

- increases capacity and quality of care for patients and their caregivers with memory disorders;
- uses a primary care approach to improve access to diagnostic assessment of memory disorders;
- reduces Emergency Room visits, specialty consultations, hospitalization, and premature institutionalization;
- utilizes appropriate referrals to specialists, improving utilization of community resources, resulting in improved health system efficiency.

The Memory Clinic has operated in Port Colborne for five years, and, in 2018, expanded into the Town of Fort Erie. Clinics are available, on a rotating basis, between Fort Erie (operating out of Douglas Memorial) and Port Colborne (operating out of Mapleview Medical Clinic).

The Town of Fort Erie has proposed a collaborative partnership with the City, over a two-year period, in order to secure Registered Nurse and administrative support for the Memory Clinics. Nursing and administrative support services would be shared, on a rotating basis, between Fort Erie and Port Colborne. The Town has requested the City share fifty percent of the cost for nursing (\$3,840 over two-years) and administrative support services (\$6,000 over two-years) in order to participate. Participating in this partnership will enable Mapleview Medical Clinic to serve eight patients per clinic each month.

4) OPTIONS AND FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

a) Do Nothing

Council may determine to receive this report for information purposes, effectively denying the request for a collaborative partnership with the Town of Fort Erie. This option is not recommended.

b) Other Options

Council may determine to provide alternate direction regarding the collaboration with the Town of Fort Erie. Currently there is no other source of funding available for this initiative. This option is not recommended.

Closed Meeting Investigator



- All meetings will be open to the public except for limited reasons which fall under a list of exceptions under the *Municipal Act*.
- No closed meeting investigator is appointed
- Any person may request an investigation if they believe the closed meeting was improperly held
- Ontario Ombudsman will respond to all investigation requests and report to Council

Conflict of Interest Act



 Legislative goal is to protect the public interest by prohibiting any member from having any "involvement" in any matter being considered by council or local board if the member has a pecuniary interest in the matter

Integrity Commissioner



- Required by March 2019
- Administers the Code of Conduct for Members of Council
 - Can provide advice to individual Members of Council
 - Review complaint and determine if investigation is necessary
 - All investigations are reported publically to Council

Ombudsman



- City uses the Ontario Ombudsman
- The Ontario Ombudsman may investigate municipalities for a number of reasons as a result of a complaint, or on their own initiative
- If investigated the Ombudsman will provide a report and recommendations to the Council.



- All Members have equal rights, privileges and obligations

Point of Order



- A Member may interrupt the person who has the floor to raise a point of order when such Member feels that there has been:
 - · a deviation or departure from these rules; or

- The Member shall clearly and succinctly state the point of order, and the Mayor shall decide on the point of order
- Thereafter, a Member shall only address the Mayor for the purpose of appealing the Mayor's decision to Council

- a trade secret or scientific, technical, commercial or financial information that belongs to the municipality or local board and has monetary value or potential monetary value; or
- a position, plan, procedure, criteria or instruction to be applied to any negotiations carried on or to be carried on by or on behalf of the municipality or local board.






I AM THE SPOKESPERSON FOR SEVERAL PEOPLE HERE TONIGHT FROM GASLINE + SHERKSTON.

I have many serious concerns as we in Port Colborne debate whether to opt in or opt out of retail sales of cannabis.

I believe Port Colborne tries to present itself as a family-oriented City with strong family values and opportunities. We want to attract more families to live and work here. We want to attract tourism to our unique and beautiful City. We need to be careful, our vibrant tourist areas have good shops attracting many tourists. Cannabis smells absolutely awful, and this will have a negative effect all around. I do not want Port Colborne to become a tourist destination for pot.

I have heard the point that Port Colborne should represent itself as being "Open for Business", and that if we opt out are we giving the message that we are really "Closed for Business". Can't we use discretion when we choose what type of business we are open for? Don't we have enough respect for ourselves and our beautiful City to want to pick businesses we really want here? We want to bring jobs to our citizens. I believe attracting businesses to our area like GE brings many and good quality stable jobs for families in our City. This also attracts families to our City. I believe retail cannabis stores will provide a few jobs, likely without benefits and likely unstable in terms of long-term work. This does not attract families to our City. There are likely to be many unwanted effects from having a retail store selling cannabis. Will they attract dubious individuals to hang around retail sites, which may scare away other customers from area shops, losing them business? Will this lead to businesses pulling up stakes and leaving the City, losing tax dollars and pushing people out rather than attracting families here?

Growing up in Merritton I knew about the drug reputation in Port Colborne. Do we want to return to that? I have seen Port Colborne change positively over the last several years, but that old reputation is not far behind. When my husband and I retired we specifically moved to Port Colborne because we liked the City, area and the people. We liked how the City cares about retirees and the needs of it's elderly. We have to be careful if we want to present Port Colborne as a family-oriented and welcoming place to live. We already have two grow operations, both in the east end. We have seen how grow ops attract crime and less than attractive personalities. Take Pinecrest Road, for example. Do you really think the criminal activity that happened there won't happen again?

An Ohio State University 3 year study in Denver published in April 2017* stated that legal marijuana shops are linked to higher levels of property crime in nearby areas. The results show that legal marijuana sales come with a cost, according to Bridget Freisthler, lead author of the study and Professor of Social Work at Ohio State. "If you're looking strictly from a Public Health standpoint, there is a reason to be somewhat concerned about having a marijuana outlet near your home." She went on to say that the findings of this as well as her previous study, suggested there are reasons for citizens to be cautious about legal marijuana sales.

If you decide to go ahead,

There are other sites to consider. What about the west end of the City, Hwy. 3 and Killaly? It's away from schools, there are few houses. Farmedica in Sherkston should not be a place for retail, there are many homes in the area that would be greatly and very negatively affected.

Have you consulted with NRPS about the possibility of related increase in patrols and manpower? We have recently heard rumours that they are considering closing the Port Colborne Police Station.

This is all about sales and business, and nothing else. Believe me, the producers and sellers are making these products very attractive. There is nothing remotely related to having a conscience about the effects of these sales. I find it ridiculous that as adults we expect our young to read warnings first and then judge on the attractive candy we show off. I hold a Masters Degree in Clinical Social Work. I practiced as a Clinical Social Worker for 31 years, I do have some experience in matters of youth.

It seems I'm not alone. In an article in the St. Catharines Standard Aug. 16 Deputy Chief Bill Fordy expressed his concern about the impact on youth. Similar to youth hanging about LCBOs trying to get adults to buy for them, will this new form of retail lead to the same concern? Also on Oct. 2 in the Welland Tribune Scott Luey, Chief Administrative Officer here in Port Colborne said information from the Province is coming out in dribs and drabs. St. Catharines also on Aug. 16 was reported as having lost confidence in the Province when they shifted from having sales through LCBO like sites to private sales. Fort Erie as of Nov. 20 is split on its decision. Ward 5 Councillor Don Lubberts said there are too many unknowns, we don't know yet what we are getting into.

A month ago while listening to local Giant FM radio, the DJ said Wainfleet, West Lincoln and Niagara-on-the-Lake are opting out of retail sale of cannabis. They laughed and said not to worry, we can all go to Port Colborne to get our pot. I laughed and cried, given the meaning of this. Port Colborne is already called "Pot Colborne". Is this the reputation we want? I do not!

Many towns and cities are deciding to opt out. I think we need to ask why and take heed. In the Standard Nov. 28 there is report of St. Catharines having an online survey and public meeting on Dec. 11 before a decision is made for their city. In an article Dec. 3 Welland also is having an online survey until Jan. 5. In the Leader there was advertisement that we were to hold an Open House Oct. 30 and a Public Meeting Nov. 13 on these issues. I even called in and inquired about this, intending to attend these meetings. All of a sudden I learned they were cancelled. Why? Is Port Colborne not interested in hearing from it's citizens, unlike other cities in Niagara? If you are planning an online survey, how do you intend to notify the public about it?
